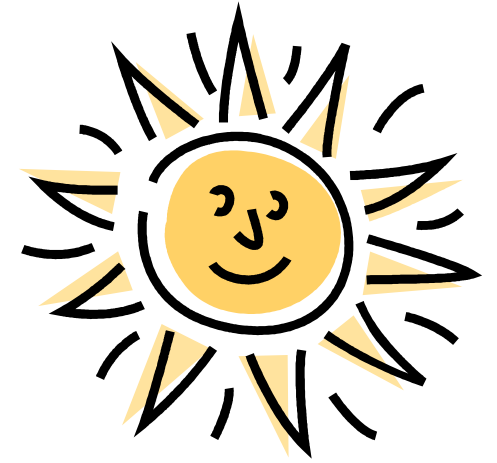

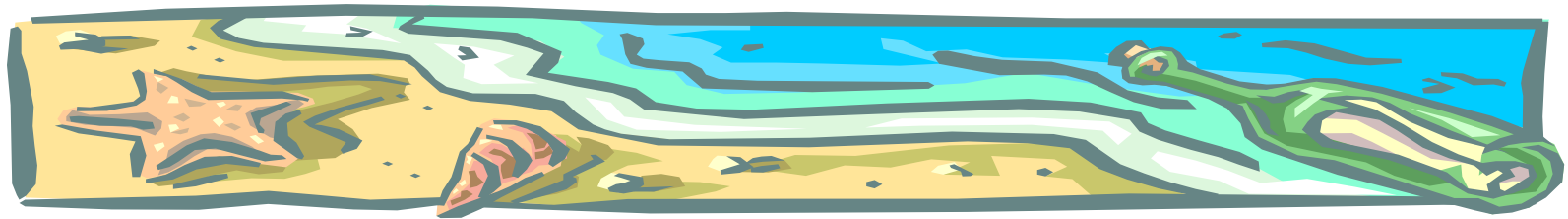

Getting a Summer Job...

WHEN TO BEGIN

It is best to begin looking for a summer job now. It will be difficult to find an available summer job the closer summer approaches, especially if you want a job related to your major.

WHERE TO BEGIN

Ask yourself a few questions:

- What am I really interested in?
- Do I want to work in the field I'm studying? Or try my hand at something new?
- Where do I want to work over the summer? Local to The Citadel, 3,000 miles away, or in a country I've never visited?
- How much money do I want to make and how many hours a week do I want to work?
- Do I have a resume to send potential employers?

RESEARCH

After contemplating the questions above, your next step is to begin researching prospective employers, company information, employment opportunities, etc.

- ✓ Check the classifieds in the local area papers.
- ✓ Contact family, friends, and professors – they may have suggestions and/or connections.
- ✓ Visit (or look online) the local Chamber of Commerce and request a list of area businesses.
- ✓ Consider signing with a temporary agency.
- ✓ If you can afford to, you should DEFINITELY volunteer! This is a GREAT resume builder.
- ✓ Visit smaller companies and request applications. Unlike larger companies, smaller companies may not always advertise online or within local newspapers.
- ✓ Take initiative! If a position isn't listed, don't assume that it doesn't exist.
- ✓ Apply for positions regardless if you meet all qualifications. Explain to the employer why you feel you can do the job.

CREATE

You need a resume!

If you have questions after applying these tips and suggestions, please send them to careercenter@citadel.edu and **remember to attach your resume**. As time allows, a Career Center staff member will review and return your resume, via email, with suggestions.

Once you have the *perfect* resume, **you will need a cover/marketing letter**. Cover/Marketing letters introduce you to potential employers and provide an opportunity to explain what you can offer them. In addition, they inform employers of your interest in working with their company. For more information and sample cover letters visit www.citadel.edu/career_services/Communication.htm.

After sending your cover letter and resume, allow adequate time for the company to receive and process your documents then follow up with them. ALWAYS contact the company in order to confirm that they received your information and reiterate your interest. DO NOT wait indefinitely to hear back from the company regarding next steps; find balance between leaving time for them to review your application and allowing too much time to pass.

INTERVIEW **PREPARE!**

Again, research the company. Be prepared to answer *any* questions asked by the interviewer. Be calm, but confident. Remember to send a thank you note after your interview, communicating your gratitude and reassuring your interest. 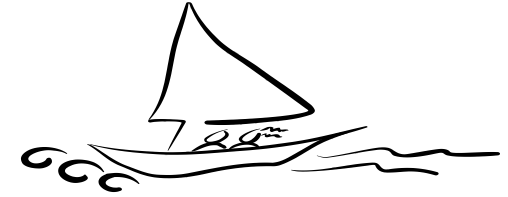

Search Chamber of Commerce Membership Directories

Some southeastern city directories are available for use in The Career Center. You may contact the Chamber of Commerce for the area you are interested in and request a copy. (There is typically a fee involved: ~\$20 or so). In many cases, you may be able to view the information online. Use these directories to obtain contact information for companies of interest to you.

Area Staffing Agencies

Contact the staffing agencies in the community you wish to work in for the summer. Local companies are often in need of temporary summer help and contact a staffing agency to fill the openings. Those attending summer school may find it easier to obtain employment that will fit around your class schedule through these agencies.

Internet Searches

Try using a search engine, such as *MSN Search* or *Google*, to look for summer jobs and/or internships, along with upcoming career fairs throughout the United States. (Keep in mind that career fairs are typically for full-time employment, but may have summer opportunities represented. Ask the contact listed for the fair if unsure).
